
Attendance Matters

We want our students to be aiming for 95% attendance for the entire year. Frequent absences can have a dramatic impact on a child's learning and impact on their ability to reach their true potential. Just one absence a week equates to 8 weeks of absence over a year where students will have missed out on valuable learning. Attending school every day helps grow our students and allows them to develop skill sets to support success beyond school. We understand that students' levels of motivation and other factors can have an impact on a child attending school. NAPLAN

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Year 7 and 9 sit each year. As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy. NAPLAN provides families with the opportunity to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

The NAPLAN assessment period for students in Year 7 and 9 is 15 March – 27 March. Parents can support their child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is part of every school's program and to do their personal best. Students will be issued timetables at least 2 weeks before the assessment period. Any concerns or worries about NAPLAN can be directed to the school and support will be provided.

Sentral Parent Portal

Our school has moved to a new management system called Sentral, which replaces Millennium. Over the next few weeks parents will receive an email detailing how to log into Sentral with their child's individual code. This will enable you to view each child's timetable, enter absence notes, view our school events calendar and receive important notifications. Welcome back for English 2023!


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Year 7 have made an extremely successful start to their first topic "Introduction to Poetry". The students have

9C Workbooks



SCIENCE

Welcome to our first Science edition of the year. So far, students have had the opportunity to get to know their teachers and classmates allowing them time for exciting and rich-filled activities. Below is a short overview of what they have enjoyed thus far.

Year 8 investigated the properties of expansion and contraction and looked at how these properties impact real world situations. Students also had the opportunity to collect and measure the temperature of ice as it melts to water and then boils.



Year 10 students modelled the theory of Natural selection using coloured toothpicks.

Year 12 Investigating Science conducted an investigation looking into the relationship between temperature and the reaction rate and in Biology, students modelled the processes involved in cell replication such as mitosis and meiosis.

Year 11 Biology students performed a first-hand investigation using transect and random guadrat to make estimates of real populations of organisms and use the available evidence to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of these methods.

The NSW Parliament Education Division is hosting The Legal Studies the and Legislature workshop via Zoom. Targeting

Year 11 students, the workshop helps students gain a deeper understanding of the nature and function of the law through the examination of the law-making process and legislative institutions.

Year 7 History - In their first History unit of the year, Year 7 have been learning about the ancient past. This has involved them gaining an understanding of the types of jobs and activities that historians and

archaeologists perform in the process of uncovering the mysteries of the past. As part of this, some of our Year 7 students have had the opportunity to experience how archaeologists work as they have

conducted their own archaeological digs on a cookie, using toothpicks to remove sediment (cookie crumbs) and excavate artefacts (choc chips). They then had to catalogue in what layer of the cookie that the artefacts were found.

Further down the track:

For our Stage 5 & 6 Geography students we are looking at providing more fieldwork opportunities for our students. Incorporating a more hands-on learning experience for our students and putting theory learnt in class into practice.

An Evening with the Ancient Greeks. A big night for our Year 7 students where they will show off their displays to parents and carers and a "Greek Style" feast will be provided for all who attend.



MATHS

Welcome back to 2023! We hope you have all had a restful break and are ready for an action packed year of Maths. Year 7 have hit the ground running engaging in activities to consolidate learning from Stage 3 and the demands of Stage 4 learning. All other grades have had a successful start to the year with Year 11 & 12 preparing for upcoming assessments. Year 9 have been busily preparing for NAPLAN strengthening their reading and analysing skills

<u>STEM</u>

STEM has started strong again this year with our new crop of Year 9 students challenging themselves, each

other and the laws of physics in various different experiments. They have started the year by learning about the design engineering process and the scientific method. We then applied these principles to each of the experiments we tried. First, we created houses of cards towering up to seven stories high. My personal favourite tower name coming in as the 'I Fell Tower'

Year 10 STEM classes are off to a flying start, engaging in aeronautical engineering. A paper plane challenge was set. Colours were issued, designs were made, tests were conducted and flight was achieved (as was many crashes). They are now in the next step of this unit, designing and the building process of balsa gliders.

School Based Apprenticeship and Traineeship (SBAT)

School based apprenticeships and traineeships (SBATs) provide students with the opportunity to attain a nationally recognised Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification and their Higher School Certificate (HSC) while gaining valuable work skills and experience through paid employment.

There are some SBAT opportunities available now for Year 10 students. If you are interested and want to know more, please see Mr Adio, the Careers Adviser.

LEARNING SUPPORT

The role of the Learning Support faculty is to provide support to students and teachers alike so that our school can continue to thrive and flourish. The ways in which we provide this support are vast and we wear many hats, including but not limited to: testing of year groups to identify areas of growth, in-class support for students with additional learning needs, and small-group interventions for literacy and numeracy.

We would love to tell you a bit more about what we do to help students be all that they can be.

QuickSmart is a targeted numeracy program that supports students in Years 7-9. Students in the program work closely with Learning Support staff to build their capacity in fundamental mathematics. We have already begun testing across these years to identify students who may benefit from this program, and will be sending permission notes home with these students with further information.

MaqLit is a 10-week reading program developed by Macquarie University to build reading capacity and confidence in students. After initial literacy testing is completed with Year 7, our staff will identify students who may benefit from additional support and issue them with permission notes containing further information about the program.

The COVID Intensive Learning Support Program provides small-group tuition to students in in the areas of literacy and numeracy. Our tutors are currently working with students in Years 8 and 9, and have already begun seeing commendable improvements. This program will continue throughout the year, and students will begin or graduate based on their ongoing needs and progress.

The HSC Minimum Standards is a compulsory test for students in Year 10. Students undertake 3 tests in reading, writing, and numeracy to ensure they meet the minimum standard for each before entering their senior years. Year 10 students have received permission notes containing further information about this testing, and will undertake these tests in Weeks 6 and 7 of Term 1. Students who do not meet one or more standards in their first test will receive targeted intervention to further build their capacity.

Learning Support is excited for another year of growth across our school, and we hope all of our students and families feel the same! If you have any questions regarding our programs or the support we offer, please call the school and ask to speak to a member of the Learning Support Team.

NSW Ministry of Health - School vaccination program

With routine vaccinations helps to protect them from serious preventable diseases such as meningococcal, whooping cough, tetanus, and cancers that are caused by HPV (human papillomavirus).

As part of the NSW School vaccination program, students in Year 7 are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Parental consent is required for your child to receive routine vaccinations at school. If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide this consent online. You will receive an email from us with details on this year's school vaccination clinic and information on how to provide consent for your child's vaccinations.

From February 2023, children in Year 7 will now only need one dose of HPV vaccination. This change has been endorsed by the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) based on evidence showing that one dose provides the same level of protection against HPV as two doses.

If you have already consented to your child receiving two doses of HPV vaccine, they will only receive one dose.

If your child previously missed their second dose of HPV vaccine, they are now considered fully vaccinated and do not require a second dose.

A small number of students who are immunocompromised are still recommended to receive a three-dose course of HPV vaccine. If your child is immunocompromised, it is important to discuss their immunisation needs with their GP.

If your child misses a school vaccination clinic, you can speak to a GP or pharmacist about catching up on vaccination.

Warami budyari (hello, how are you?)

Big warm welcome to the community out there and welcome back to 2023. We have a number of programs running this year to support our Aboriginal students in their learning and making sure that they engage in the school community. I also want to take this opportunity to remind parents and carers that you are always welcome to come and speak with us if you have any questions or concerns about your child's learning, whether it be face-to-face or over the phone.

Some upcoming programs for 2023:

Tutor Squads - runs fortnightly on Day 3 of your child's timetable during periods 5-6. We will have teachers giving up their time with the help of an SLSO, to provide one-on-one tutoring to our students who may need help with course work, homework or assignments. Devices will be provided to students who attend so they may access their Google classrooms and any other online resource.

Souths Cares - Again with the support form the people of South Sydney Rabbitohs, this program runs fortnightly on Day 9 of your child's timetable, during periods 5-6. This mentoring program focuses on building students confidence with a cultural identity focus, the importance of goal setting, and getting students to think about career pathways. Looking forward to working with the team from Souths again this year and I know so are our students. The Souths Cares also reach out to families during the school break to keep that close connection with students and families.



Personalised Learning Pathways (PLPs) - various staff who are part of the Aboriginal Education Team at Casula High school will be working with students and families to work on the individual student's Personalised Learning Pathway (PLP) in Term 1. We will be reaching out to families and encouraging them to be part of this process. It's all about students setting goals for the year, and then discussing support structures the school can put in place at school and at home, so that students have the best possible chance of success in meeting their goals.

School to Work Program - There are 3 of our Year 11 & 12 students participating in this program this year. Students are mentored with a focus on career pathways.

Pathways to Dreaming - this is yet to be finalised, but in conjunction with WSU. this is a new program to Casula High School which involves in-school workshops, Zoom meetings and on campus visits at Liverpool and Campbelltown campus. Watch this space for more information.

Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) - the school will revisit its RAP, where staff, students and community members come together to evaluate where the school is regarding Aboriginal education, setting targets for the future on where we intend to be. We are asking any family members who may be interested in being part of this to contact the school and ask for Mr Gandiaga.

Staying SHARP


Casula High School is a proud Positive Behaviour for Learning school. We have created a series of behavioural expectations that suit our unique school population. We use these expectations to support and reward our students.

Dear Parents and Carers,

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Each year students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

From 2023, NAPLAN is moving to Term 1 and will take place from **Wednesday 15 March** to **Monday 27 March 2023**. The reason for this change is so that results can be returned to schools earlier in the year which will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and plan accordingly.

NAPLAN tests are just one part of our school learning assessment program and questions are primarily based on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year of schooling.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2023, our school will undertake activities to help students to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked.

Students and parents can access the <u>public demonstration site</u> to familiarise themselves with NAPLAN and the types of questions and tools available. Excessive preparation for NAPLAN is not required nor recommended.
